
Watch out, Little Lion!



"I don't feel like it," said Jo And rolled on his back.


"It's cooler in the shade."

Especially when he had eaten well, like last night.




4 Mother Lion was lying on the round rocks in front of the den with the other lionesses. They were sleeping, too.


Cautiously, Lea crept behind the porcupine. Whoush! There it disappeared in a hole in the ground!

"It's time for the rainy season to come!" said Mother Lion.


As dusk fell, the big lions the big lions went down to the river.

And then she jumped into a puddle, that it was splashing on Jo and Jap.




Jo and Jap splashed back. Soon the three of them were were joyfully rolling around in the muddy pools that were forming everywhere.




"Now we have plenty of Water and don't have to walk all the way to the river to drink!", said Mother Lion. "Soon the lake will be filled with water, too."

where they were going.




27 Lea, Jo and Jap played all day at the lake, which the rain had filled.

"Are you afraid?" asked Lea. Father Lion did not answer.


"Fear makes one cautious.
